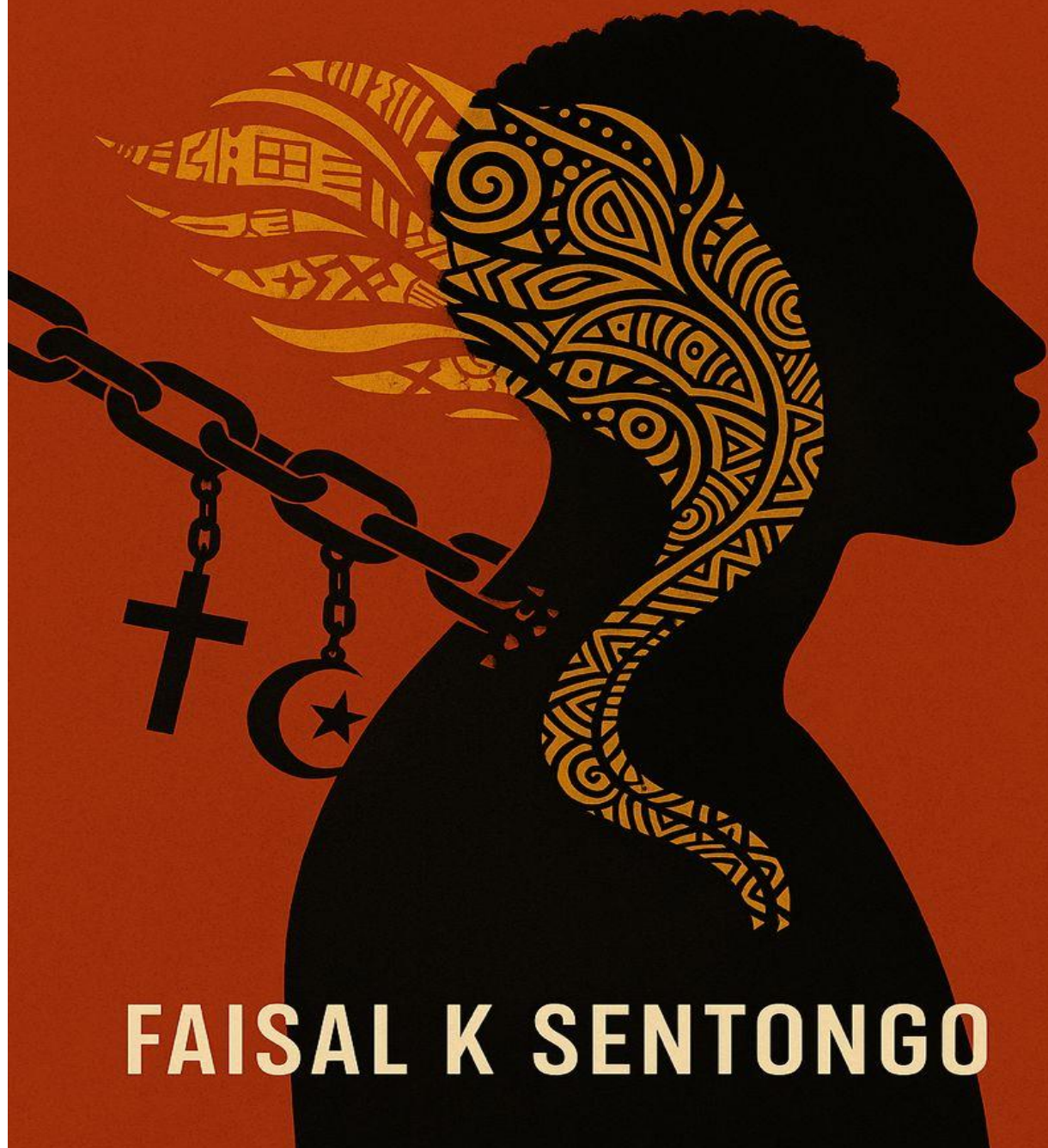

✦ ***If God Exists and Loves Us, Why Is There So Much Pain?***

Christianity teaches that “*God is love*” (**1 John 4:8**). The Quran teaches that Allah is “*Most Merciful*” (**Ar-Rahman**). But how do we reconcile these claims with:

- Children dying of hunger every minute?
- A man dying at the hospital gate because he couldn’t afford medicine?
- A woman raped and told to forgive her rapist because “vengeance belongs to the Lord”?
- Wars fought in the name of religion, killing millions?

If this is love, it is a love that hides while the world burns.

✦ ***The Myth of Free Will: A Dangerous Excuse***

Religious leaders will say, “But God gave us free will. It is man who chooses evil.”

But this is a flawed excuse:

- If you give a child fire and say, “It’s your free will to touch it or not,” are you loving or careless?
- If God is all-knowing, didn’t He know how much evil humans would choose? Did He create us just to watch us destroy each other?
- Why give free will and threaten eternal punishment?

Free will becomes a trap: You’re told you’re free, but if you use that freedom to question, you’re condemned.

“Choose this day whom you will serve... but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.” (Joshua 24:15) — Yet, is it really a choice when eternal punishment awaits disagreement?

◆ ***Love and Hate: Two Forces, One Creator?***

If God is the creator of everything, then He created:

- Love and hate
- Peace and war
- Riches and poverty
- Health and disease

How can a god who “loves all equally” watch one child sleep on silk sheets and another on a cold street with no food?

Either:

1. He is not in control
2. He does not care
3. Or He does not exist as we were told

“*The Lord makes poor and makes rich; he brings low and he exalts.*” (1 Samuel 2:7) —
If He chooses both, then He chooses suffering too.

◆ *Why Do We Worship a God Who Rewards the Cruel?*

Let’s be honest. Many of the richest and most powerful people on earth got there by lying, stealing, exploiting others. And yet they flourish.

Meanwhile, good people suffer. They pray. They fast. They tithe. But they still die poor. Or worse, they suffer for believing.

Psalm 37:25 says: “*I have never seen the righteous forsaken or their children begging bread.*”

But all over Africa and the world, righteous people beg for bread daily. They bury their children. They live in slums. What then? Was the scripture wrong? Or was it simply not meant for us?

Quran (**Surah Al-Baqarah 2:286**): “Allah does not burden a soul beyond that it can bear...” — Yet we see people take their own lives from unbearable pain. Is the verse comforting or denying reality?

✦ ***The Truth We Fear to Admit***

Let's call it what it is:

- The system is unfair
- The world is not balanced
- Power protects itself, not the people
- Religion has become a soft drug to calm the oppressed, not liberate them
- Charity exists because justice doesn't

Why do we need NGOs to feed the hungry while billionaires have enough to solve it all in a day? If humans can stop it but don't, and God can stop it but won't, where is the love?

Proverbs 22:2: “The rich and the poor meet together: the Lord is the maker of them all.” — But why make such inequality?

Quran (**Surah Al-Balad 90:10-11**): “And have We not shown him the two ways? But he has not broken through the difficult pass...” — The verse talks about choice, but ignores the fact that opportunity is not equally given.

✦ ***The Bible and Quran: Beautiful Words, But Dangerous Absolutes***

Both books have verses about love, but also verses that contradict that love:

Bible:

- “Love is patient, love is kind... it does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud.” (1 Corinthians 13:4-5)
- Then why does God in Exodus 20:5 say “I am a jealous God... punishing the children for the sin of the parents”?
- “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.” (Matthew 5:9) — Yet He flooded the entire earth in Genesis, killing men, women, and children.

Quran:

- “Indeed, Allah is with those who fear Him and those who are doers of good.” (Quran 16:128)
- Yet it also says: “Kill them wherever you find them...” (Quran 2:191)
- “And do not consume one another’s wealth unjustly or send it [in bribery] to the rulers...” (Quran 2:188) — Yet we see Muslim leaders among the most corrupt.

You can quote love or violence from the same book. And that’s the problem. It leaves room to justify anything.

✦ ***A World Built on Betrayal, Power, and Pretending***

- Love has become conditional.
- Honesty is punished.

Uncolonized “The Return of My Mind”

- Money speaks louder than compassion.
- Politicians lie and thrive.
- Religious leaders profit from pain.
- And most people remain silent because they fear being seen as bitter or faithless.

But silence is complicity.

And questioning is not hate — it’s intelligence.

We need to ask:

- Why is the world like this?
- Who benefits from our blindness?
- And what if truth is not divine, but simply human courage?

✦ *Final Thought*

A god who is all-powerful, all-loving, and all-knowing would not need to test us through pain, or punish us for questioning injustice.

If He is love, let the world reflect it. If He is not, then let us stop pretending. Because continuing to worship while ignoring suffering is not devotion — it is denial.

Truth must matter more than comfort.

And honesty must matter more than approval.
